



REMOVING THE PORTABLES



In March 2022, Tandem Construction, the company contracted for the completion of Building 17 and other additional renovations, completed the final phase of construction at Pine View: removing almost all portables from campus.

The two portables that will stay on campus will be used for storage and as an office space for Take Stock in Children Inc., a nonprofit organization that aims to provide mentorship and scholarship opportunities for low-income students.

"WHAT IS DEMOLITION?

Since wooden portables, by law, cannot be repurposed as classrooms, they will be demolished, or destroyed, on site.

In order to provide "swing space," or a temporary instructional environment while renovations are being carried out, Florida schools use portables as classroom space — Pine View was one of them. These portables usually increase in number over the years to account for student body overpopulation. According to project manager Steve Clark, the removal of "swing space" portables means more room for fields and open play areas.

Movie Review: Encanto

Exploring the complications and blessings tied up in family dynamics is not a new concept. Movies, regardless of genre, do it all the time. However, in Walt Disney Motion Pictures' "Encanto," this concept ventured somewhere entirely different.

The Colombia-inspired musical tunes into "The Family Madrigal," each member of which has a magical gift that they use to help out the rest of their community – ex-

On the night when her cousin Antonio is bestowed a gift, Mirabel walks away from the cel-

ebration, dejected, when she sees cracks growing in the walls of her home, the magical "Casita." She tries to warn her family that Casita's magic is fading, but no one believes her.

At this point, Mirabel realizes that saving Casita – and her family's magic – is a responsibility that is wholly her own. As she begins to investigate the origins of the cracks. Mirabel

One of the most noteworthy aspects of "Encanto" is the soundtrack. Each of 8 original songs by superstar Lin-Manuel Miranda and 27 score pieces by Germaine Franco are incredibly unique and enthralling. "We don't talk about Bruno" has been a massive hit, and was even performed live at the 94th Academy Awards.

While the music is incredible and the plot compelling, the under-lying message of the movie is what shines the most.

probably a green one named Bird. My house was absolutely gorgeous and I was so proud of it. Meep City simply cannot be beaten in its updates, gameplay, and community.




vile creations ever seen by man.



Aaisha Aces Taekwondo

During her private martial arts lesson at Red Tiger Martial Arts, second-grader Aaisha Asif takes her stance in front of her Taekwondo instructor, Master Hwang. Hwang is a 3 Dan, which means having 7 degrees in black belt (the highest belt in Taekwondo).

Before class begins, Hwang has Asif pledge the seven values of Taekwondo, with the first three values being: 1. Respect all seniors and instructors, 2. Never misuse Taekwondo, 3. Be a champion of freedom and justice.

After the pledge, Asif stretches for 15 minutes then begins to practice poomsae, the

forms of Taekwondo that the student must learn before advancing to the next belt. At the end of the lesson, the students bow to their master and instructors, then greet their parents in the same way.

Asif has been following this routine since she was 3 years old, hoping to someday practice Taekwondo professionally, and ultimately at the Olympic level.

Since her younger self aspired to become a Taekwondo master, Asif has put her heart and soul into it, practicing Taekwondo three times a week, and practicing at home every day. All this practice is paying off, as Asif has a brown high belt, which features a broad black

stripe running horizontally through the middle of the belt. This is the belt right before the first black belt, and black belt is the highest you can achieve.

Besides regular practices, Asif has trained for the Taekwondo Grand Championship. This event brings in martial arts schools from all over Florida, and was attended by schools from Tampa, Orlando, Kissimmee, Tallahassee, and Miami.

Sadia Asif, Aaisha's mother, explains her daughter's participation in the event: "She took private lessons with Master Hwang, who's a 3 Dan in board breaking, and placed third in her level; poomsae was placed first in her level, hurdle was

placed second in her level, ... nunchucks [she] was placed first in her level, and combat, she was placed second in her level."

They trained for six weekends, for four hours each session one-on-one with the masters. Asif's hard work, dedication, and training with her master and instructor payed off, as Asif went on to win the Taekwondo Grand Championship.

Gutierrez took on competitive swimming last year, although she has been swimming since she was one year old. Gutierrez swims with the Swordfish, a swimming team in Laurel Oaks Country Club. In season, Gutierrez swims for an hour every Tuesday and Thursday.

"We're trying to reinforce the sport discipline and passion for art, to us, as family, it is important that they learn to enjoy different activities besides academics, although we're mainly focused on academics. Education has to be a multidisciplinary learning process," Monsalve-Gutierrez said, wanting to emphasize well-roundedness in the family.








March 4-
